Osmotherley Area Parish Council

The Parish Council met last week and among the items discussed was the response to the winter weather which had caused a multitude of problems in the area. Unfortunately Highways were unable due to funding and other reasons to keep all back roads open at all times and had to concentrate on the main roads. Keith Henderson did all he could to try to make sure that footpaths in the villages were clear and he even tried to ensure that the ice which formed near the North End water leak was at least gritted. Highways eventually were able to jet this pipe which should have taken the water and were able to clear the blockage and let it flow again but because this problem re-occurs a site meeting with all the agencies concerned is being arranged to find a permanent solution to prevent it happening again.

The Police attended and informed the meeting that fuel and vehicle thefts continue in the area and everyone is asked to report anything suspicious. A Neighbourhood Watch scheme is being established for Oswaldene and similar arrangements can be made by contacting the Police if anyone wishes to volunteer to cover a different part of the village. For the last few years a voluntary prescription service has delivered the requests and then collected medicines for those who are unable to do so themselves but the Pharmacy have now introduced a delivery service themselves and these volunteers will now disband their activity, thanks to all who were involved with this initiative.

Hambleton District Council are conducting a survey to find out if anyone wishes to have an allotment, all enquiries to either Danny Manging or direct to HDC at Stone Cross. Dog fouling is seen as a growing problem, particularly at the top of North End, on School Lane and in the Methodist Chapel passage and those who do not look after things should be ashamed of themselves.

The Wildlife group have met recently and among their suggestions is an idea that the grass verges should be cut at different intervals to help wildlife and this will be considered at one of the spring meetings. The National Park are looking into funding for access in the area and would assist with the idea of promoting circular walks and this idea will be taken forward through LEADER funding initiatives.

We have an author visit planned for this term and also Year 6 will spend a week at East Barnby doing outdoor pursuits in March with year 6's from the Allertonshire Cluster of small schools. And I am sure there will be lots , lots more!

Winding up the Voluntary Prescription Delivery Scheme

For the past 3 years or so, a group of volunteers from the village has run a scheme to collect prescriptions (for those villagers entitled to free prescriptions) from Mowbray House Surgery and delivered them to the Top Shop for individual collection. This scheme will cease at the end of April. Why? Because a viable, free and more convenient alternative now exists.

Day Lewis Pharmacy which is located in Mowbray House offers a free weekly delivery service every Thursday which will get your prescription to your home address. You will not have to collect it from the Top Shop. All you have to do to take advantage of this service is to complete a form which is available from the Top Shop or from Day Lewis Pharmacy. If you leave your completed form at the Top Shop, we will arrange to deliver it to Day Lewis for you.

Please ensure you register with Day Lewis by the end of April, if you wish to take advantage of this service. There will be no deliveries to the Top Shop after May 1st.

Could we take this opportunity to thank all the volunteers who have given their time (and cost of fuel) to help their fellow villagers with this voluntary service over the past few years. Could we also thank the Top Shop for the its forbearance with this scheme because without the help of Dave Burgon and his staff, it would not have worked.

Village Hall News
