Alan Turner-sadly died in a tragic climbing accident on Great Gable on 31st Jan 2010. Below are contributions, reflecting Alan's various interests and valuable contributions to this Community -he was an inspiration to many and will be sadly missed.

Alan was a Parish Councillor for over 15 years and represented the Parish of Winton, Stank and Hallikeld on the Osmotherley Area Parish Council extremely well during that time. He was Vice-Chairman under Howard Higgs when I first knew him and became Chairman in 2006 when I joined the Council. When I became Chairman in 2008 he became Vice-Chairman and I very much appreciated his generous help and support. He was always willing to step into the breach at the last minute if it became necessary. Alan was a very enthusiastic and hardworking Councillor and will be remembered, and very much missed, for his clear thinking, attention to detail and organisational skills. He had an ability to see through a problem and to find the answer in a practical and opportune manner. Above all we will all miss his unfailing sense of humour. Noel Coward



It was with great regret that I learnt of the untimely death of Alan who had represented the Winton area on the Parish Council for over 15 years and whose knowledge and interest in the area was second to none. Whatever he did he entered into it with an open mind and always considered the view of others even to the extent of researching something even when he felt that it was contrary to his own view point.

He will be remembered by many for his own "pylon" ploughed into a field at the side of the A684 to demonstrate his and the area's opposition to the National Grid and its ultimately successful development. Recently he toured various wind farms to assess their impact before putting forward the Parish Council's case in opposition to the current application to construct 4 turbines literally fields away within view of his own home.

Together with his wife Janet they built up their home and business from very small beginnings, initially with a fruit farm then developing a larger scale egg laying unit and to its present reliance on grain production. He carefully assessed the risks and outcomes of these enterprises and was always able to be at the forefront of new technology without appearing in any way to be other than a modest and caring custodian of the countryside. His interests there were far ranging from being a leader of the Northallerton Young Farmers Club, to having a great knowledge of the environment and the impact that change was having, to establishing a thriving diversification enterprise assessing and certificating when appropriate equipment used by other farmers. His passing leaves a void in the community at large and this will be very hard to fill and we all wish his widow and their family all the support that can be given at this tragic time. Len Cragg

Alan was the instigator and chairman of the Wildlife Group, which was set up in response to part of the Parish Plan. As a farmer and keen participator in outdoor pursuits, he was closer to nature and the countryside than many of us and his enthusiasm for conserving and fostering wildlife alongside agriculture was obvious. In his quiet and unassuming way, Alan encouraged and cajoled those of us in the Group to pursue and complete our surveys over the past two years and he was on the point of starting to collate the information we have gathered. We all had the greatest respect for Alan and I can think of no better way of showing that than by continuing the work he had started and completing it. Alan had always been an outdoor person. As his daughters grew up he had more time for leisure and joined Swaledale Outdoor Club in 1996 to pursue activities that were new to him. He quickly became a strong and competent walker, imparting his farming knowledge to his companions on local hikes. Alan loved mountains and, notably, had climbed 136 Munroes (Scottish peaks over 3000 feet). This interest also took him overseas with the club on more exotic trips to Peru, Morocco, South Africa and the Himalaya. His walking skills progressed to encompass scrambling, rock climbing and general mountaineering. He was also a regular cyclist with the club, both on road and mountain bike rides. Most recently, he took advantage of the present cold winter to try his hand at cross country skiing near Richmond which he thoroughly enjoyed. Osmotherley Area Parish Council

The February meeting opened with a one minute silence as a tribute to Alan Turner who had been a member for the past 15 years, but who was so tragically killed when climbing in the Lakes recently. As reported elsewhere he had represented the rural parish of Winton, Stank and Hallikeld where he farmed and had meticulously carried out his many roles These included Chairman and Vice-Chairman, he always had a keen understanding of what was needed for this community.

Matters of importance covered by the meeting included various safety issues in Osmotherley, in particular the need for repairs to be carried out to fencing along Quarry Lane and the need to prevent further water leaks which could potentially be an ice hazard. Following the prolonged cold weather Highways were to be asked again to replenish the salt bins and heaps and Broadacres have been approached to find out why they have failed so far to carry out a duty of care to the mainly elderly residents with the provision of gritting in this private estate. The condition of various roads was discussed and Highways will be asked to carry out improvements where needed, this includes Chester Lane in Kirby Sigston as well other locations which have already been drawn to their attention.

Progress on the handover of the Cemetery from District Council responsibility to a Parish matter is slow due to the need to seek indemnities regarding any possible contamination as a consequence of a recent fuel leak and also because there is a need to ensure that any unsafe memorials do not present a hazard in future.

The only planning application concerned Vane House and this was supported because it was felt that the proposed works would greatly tidy up the site and that it would also mean that vehicles could be parked off road alleviating parking and access for all. To date there has not been any information given by Hambleton regarding the wind turbine application, because they are still waiting for a report from the MOD.

Village Hall

New policy for purchase of equipment for affiliate

organisations We've introduced a new policy to support purchase of equipment for regular hall users. This has been discussed at recent meetings and is open to organisations affiliated to the village hall. This includes the school, preschool, Grasshoppers, theatre group, Catholic church, garden club, youth club and table tennis clubs. The policy is available on the village hall notice board and to affiliated groups at our monthly meetings. Our next meeting is March 16th 7.30pm in the supper room.

Heating issues and searching for a volunteer

We are aware that there have been problems with heating the hall during the cold weather and discussed the issue with hall users at our last meeting.

Some users have told us they did not do not know about the booster switch in the kitchen. This has to be pressed 3 times to switch the heating on for two hours. As well as using the boosters, it is important to keep the stage curtains drawn because the stage/loft is a heat sink. Users are asked to come an hour before their event starts to put the heating on. The user information notice in the hall explains how to use the heating. Users should seek advice from

the people on the contact list if they want a run-through on how it works.

Hall users have reported that the boosters appear to be cutting out. As well as ensuring the heaters have been cleaned and serviced, we will look into upgrading the heating system.

We hope that the planned new loft will help with this heating issue. The loft will reduce the heat sink effect of the staged area and provide better storage for equipment. We are still looking for a volunteer to oversee the work. This involves getting estimates, finding a contractor to do the work and supervising the work. If you can help contact Dave Morris 883162
