Parish Council Meeting April

The current council conveened for the final time before the new council meets in May following an election process, overseen by Hambleton District Council. Mr Tim Swales and Mr Danny Manging have both stood down. Grateful thanks was expressed by all for the long service to the community both had provided over the years. Their contributions would be sorely missed. Two residents have therefore been elected unopposed to serve from 2nd May 2019. Carolyn Nozedar representing Ellerbeck and Richard Horner representing Osmotherley.

The quad bike, which has seen little service in the last three years has not been taxed and insured for the coming year and possible disposal methods will be looked into. The highways issues, reported at the last meeting, have been reopened by NYCC however, the yellow lining suggested has been refused; Chester Lane would be put on a schedule; the cobbles would need to be better identified; the white lining will be completed ASAP and Bullamoor Road would be looked into by Councillor Hugill. Back Lane potholes would need more work on them but would be reported to NYCC. A Footpath Survey would be requested in the village as many of the footpaths were considered dangerous to both residents and visitors alike.

The Play Area is nearing completion and it is hoped that many more children would make use of it during the summer.

Concern over the refuse bins between the fish and chip shop and the Queen Catherine was raised and a church faculty (planning permission) is required to facilitate the moving of them to the churchyard.

Three planning applications were discussed with two being supported and a long running application requiring a site visit by North York Moors Planning Committee.

The accounts for the current period were presented and accepted and the annual accounts, which had been internally audited, were presented and approved. Income was £33,000 and expenditure £29,000 with some outstanding expenditure of £6000 relating to income received in advance.

A meeting would be requested with the owners of Thompson's Shop for an update on the project and meeting with the Chairman and Vice Chairman.

The next meeting and AGM will be held on the 16th May 2019.

OVT - Blithe Spirit Review

First of all, I must admit my review may be influenced by the fact that two of my closest friends were in the cast. However, so enjoyable was the evening that, when asked to write a review, I jumped at the chance!

I do enjoy Noel Coward's ironic humour and use of language. When delivered well, the words and intimate dialogue come to life in a way that is truly enjoyable and the cast brought the words off the page with aplomb – all of which clearly benefited from Angie Thomsett's skills as a director.

Barrie Robinson, as Charles Condomine, moved around the stage with ease and fluidity, delivering his quips, reactions, under-the-breath-comments, and hundreds of lines in a way that brought the character and the whole evening to life – a truly inspired performance!

Heather Rowe, as Ruth Condomine, was highly believable as the insecure and long-suffering partner of Charles and her ability to ignore the apparition of his first wife (Elvira) to deliver some complex word-interplay was very clever. Talking of Elvira, Teresa Taylor's portrayal of the role was ethereal – she glided around the stage with mischief and pathos.

Diane Stokeld, as Madam Arcati, delivered one of the best character portrayals I've seen on the stage in some time. She played an amusing and authentic combination of eccentricity and indignation which left the audience in stiches on more than once occasion.

Doctor Bradman and his wife, Joyce (Tris Sillars and Lynne Mortimer), were both brilliant in bringing the séance to life with cynicism and nervous excitement. Esther Thorniley-Walker, as the maid, portrayed her character with sensitivity and believable confusion.

The scenery and set was very well done by Jean Lake and Brian Holder's crashing ornaments were very atmospheric and added an extra dimension to the whole experience.

As always with productions like this, there are lots of people in the background who will have played a role in making the production such an enjoyable evening.
