# **Osmotherley Area Parish Council**

The meeting held on February 20th 2020 first heard from a resident of Oswaldene reporting on the excessive amounts of water leaching down the fields, into the Play Area and Cuddy Lane and into Oswaldene. This appears to be caused by the blocked gullies at the entrance to Westfields. The Clerk was asked to report this to Yorkshire Water for comment.

The owner of the Woodyard on Clack Lane attended to suggest that the land could be used for a car park. Whilst this was greeted largely with enthusiasm it was tempered with knowing that it was a mile from the village centre and thus was likely to see little use. Further discussions are needed to move this forward.

Discussions have been held with residents who have erected 'Private Parking' notices to reserve places and to restrict visitors to the village making use of these and parking irresponsibly. Whilst the PC are sympathetic and understand the issues it cannot condone such notices and indeed have asked that they be removed.

A meeting has been arranged with the Highways Officer to discuss the car parking arrangements in front of the Queen Catherine. A representative of Stokesley Police attended to discuss the monthly report of incidents, of which there were two. Further discussions regarding flooding issues in Thimbleby were raised and the Council Rep will report our concerns.

The Council Rep reported that NYCC had raised the Council Tax by 3.99% next year and that the National Park were seeking a new Chief Executive. The damp-proofing carried out in the Village Hall in January 2019 has had its first year follow up visit to determine whether the signs of damp are under control. Considering the weather this winter overall, we are happy to report that it has been largely a success. The Village Hall Committee will discuss in more detail at their next meeting.

The Vice Chairman reported on proposed works to repair the bus shelter and potential changes to the layout of the public conveniences, which are ongoing. The Burials Officer asked that the burial fees, not increased since 2016, were reviewed. The Clerk reported on comparable fees at local cemeteries and revisions were approved. Six new planning applications had been received since our last meeting and circulated prior to the meeting for consideration.

These were discussed at the meeting and given support to all. Residents of Thimbleby have supported the suggestion that a defibrillator be introduced to the old telephone box in the village, which the PC adopted recently. Public liability insurance could be an issue for residents going forward, but the PC offered to include it on our own insurance subject to village agreement.

The club holds its AGM at 7.00pm followed by an illustrated talk at 7.45pm on the National Gardens Scheme by Biddy Marshall. As well as covering the origins of the scheme and charities it supports, she will be able to give the perspective of a garden owner welcoming the public to her garden in Whixley over many years. An opportunity to whet the appetite for exploring 'new' gardens once summer arrives!

## THE OSMOTHERLEY SOCIETY

### WORLD SCOUT JAMBOREE—THANKS TO THE COMMUNITY

Ellis Fitzgerald reports: This summer I went to the World Scout Jamboree in America. The Jamboree was a massive camp for 40,000 scouts from over 150 countries. I went as part of a group of 36 scouts from North Yorkshire and Durham.

Our trip started in New York for a packed weekend of sight seeing including a moving visit to the 9/11 memorial. From there we headed to the Jamboree site- the Summit Bechtel Reserve. Soon after we arrived there was an opening ceremony with guests from all over the world including Bear Grylls and Anousheh Ansari, an astronaut. They spoke about protecting the environment and making a real difference. Meeting new people and experiencing different cultures was an important part of the Jamboree. We learnt games from Swedish scouts, shared meals with scouts from Taiwan and hiked with German scouts. Of course, there were lots of adventurous activities and my personal favourites were climbing and paddle boarding. At the closing ceremony, Ban Ki Moon (the former UN secretary general) talked about becoming global citizens and how we should strive to create community between people, not differences.

After the Jamboree we visited Washington DC and our final stop in Oshawa, Canada where we stayed with a scout group. They invited us to their homes where we ate together and discussed life in Canada and scouting. We went swimming in Lake Ontario and visited Niagara Falls and Toronto.

The experience I had this summer was amazing but none of it could have happened without all of the support I have had from everyone, especially the Church and my scout group.
