Osmotherley Area Parish Council Meeting - 19th June 2025

The meeting was attended by representatives of the village Environment Group who asked for confirmation that the graveyard wall would now be left to recover from the weed/wildflower removal. The Chairman gave assurances that this was a one off and would not be repeated. The future of the proposed village car park was raised. The PC have documented this in previous newsletters but for **clarification**...The survey carried out by NYC did not support the development of a car park and the PC has no further routes to explore in this case. A publicly funded option would cost in excess of £500k and whilst over the years a lot of time and effort has been spent on researching this option, it is highly **unlikely** to happen. The trees owned by the PC will be trimmed in the autumn following consultation with the national park. This will only be to remove epicormic growth from trunks and where necessary to raise the height where it causes issues to vehicles or pedestrians.

The defibrillator training, which took place on the 22nd May, was attended by around 25 residents and was considered very successful and the Thimbleby defibrillator will be adopted by the PC to provide continued support.

Speeding cars were reported as a concern on North End, however there is little more that can be done by Highways without this issue being regularly reported to the Police to solve the issue, however the Police have a Community Speed Watch Scheme which can be accessed by searching for 'Community Speed Watch North Yorkshire Police'.

The play area equipment will have some maintenance and repair work done to maintain the safety levels required in the coming months.

The Cleveland Way path out of the village is in need of strimming and a directional arrow is also missing on Back Lane. The Clerk will follow this up.

Concerns were raised regarding the opening of the Pintail Nest Farm Shop on Winton Bank. The Clerk will follow up these concerns with the planning authorities.

The PC understand there are concerns in the village regarding the Pre School building and associated running costs. The Chairman assured all present that the PC is fully supportive of the Pre School and will do all it can to assist with maintaining this vital part of the village infrastructure. A public meeting will be held in the village hall on 16th July to discuss the issues further. The parish website is at www.osmotherlev.org.uk

NATURE NOTES: 18th June

Now that the dog roses and elderflowers have taken over from blackthorn and hawthorn blossom in the hedgerows, you might want to think about making your own elderflower cordial. The much-needed rain rescued annual plants and grassland, although more is needed – sorry, sun-lovers! Nature is wonderfully resilient and it is great to see the rebels which insist on reappearing after they have been mown down – daisies, buttercups and white clover. Hurrah! The curse of the strimmer is evident when banks and verges are unnecessarily cut – not for safety or sightlines but because it is easy to do. The ox-eye daisies have been exceptional along the verges of the A19 and thanks should go to North Yorkshire Council for their revised mowing practice which has enabled these flowers to flourish. There was a bank of them on the way up Clack Bank but alas, much of it has been mown and the daisies left wilting on the ground. However, a walk from Oswaldene to roughly opposite the wood yard yielded 40 different plants in flower. A list is on the Environment notice board and it would be interesting to know if others can identify more. The little yellow Tormentil hugs the ground while Hedge Bindweed decorates the hedges with pure white flowers (not welcome in the garden but a delight in the wild). Dove's Foot Cranesbill manages to hold on in the corner of the churchyard behind the Fish & Chip shop but little else except determined buttercups and a tangle of Goosegrass or Cleavers, Poppies and Sow Thistles outside the church.

The swifts are back too – what would an Osmotherley summer be like without them wheeling and screaming round the village? Ted Hughes wrote a poem about swifts and part of it says "They've made it again, Which means the globe's still working, the Creation's still waking refreshed, our summer's Still to come." Long may they continue to come.

Not just swifts but a flycatcher, spotted one evening, sitting on a telephone wire and darting out every time an insect flew past.

WELCOME BACK - OSMOTHERLEY VILLAGE THEATRE

After a long absence, Osmotherley Village Theatre returned with a one-night performance of an expanded play "Butter in a Lordly Dish", based on a 1948 BBC radio broadcast of an Agatha Christie thriller. One of the consequences of Covid has been that many social activities have been lost and never recovered. It takes an enthusiastic team or an individual with a lot of drive to revive the fortunes of amateur theatre. But in Osmotherley, there was just that man, Brian Holder as playwright, producer and director. Starting with the Christie script, he recreated the static recording into a live performance and augmented this by writing a first act to introduce the cast before they made their live broadcast in the second act.

What made it fascinating and perhaps confusing was that the audience was now presented with a play that was neither just a scripted broadcast nor a fully acted-out drama – but something between the two. Despite the cast simply speaking into a BBC studio microphone they just couldn't help themselves from acting out their roles.

Every member of the large cast excelled in their cameo parts but special mention must be made of the lecherous Sir Luke Enderby (played by Barrie Robinson) and his intended lover Julia Keene (Heather Rowe). Their assignation in a country cottage ended in typical Christie style with a gruesome murder served up as a luxury meal on a "lordly dish".

The production was a fine example of a splendid team effort by the cast and backstage led by an inspired producer/director. By the welcome given from a packed audience, it was clear that amateur theatre is back in demand. Long may Osmotherley Theatre continue in the future to satisfy that demand.
